



You never know what you'll find out at Grove Service in Cassadaga Spiritualist Camp

A loved one may come through to let you know how they are doing on the other side or you just might find out you have gifts and could be a medium just like others in the camp.

That's what happened when Jacob Liskowiak of Port Orange received a message from Rev. Dr. Louis Gates, who is the pastor of Colby Memorial Temple.

Gates, a doctor of metaphysical sciences, told Jacob that he had the gifts to do exactly what he does – be a medium.

Later, Jacob said he recently began sensing and experiencing things around him differently.

"I just feel that I don't have to push and work so hard," he said. "I can just let things happen."

Jacob said he plans on returning to Cassadaga as much as possible.

"I enjoy the sense of community here and the peace here," he said.

Grove Service came about more

than 40 years ago and was held in the groves near Colby Memorial Temple, Louis said. Eventually, it moved inside (for obvious reasons) to the Andrew Jackson Davis Building.

Louis said there are two benefits of the service.

It gives mediums and student mediums the chance to show what the Spiritualist Camp is about and it gives the public a chance to see "what we do and who we are without having to pay." He pointed out a basket is passed with proceeds going to the upkeep of the buildings.

Richard Russell, a camp medium, has participated in Grove Service for many years. He said he enjoys giving messages to the public and it gives him the opportunity to "give back what I've learned in the past 20 years – to give the peace and contentment I have."

Grove Service is a place where those in audience have a chance to learn things about themselves that have not even crossed their minds, Richard said.

"It's the only opportunity sometimes to reach people," he said, of

Grove Service. "We bring in loved ones from spirit. It proves the continuity of life."

Richard brought in a loved one for Matt Wilson of New Smyrna.

Matt, who has visited Cassadaga several times, said he wasn't surprised when his grandmother on his mother's side came through.

"She's always around me," he said.

Matt said he was hoping his wife would be chosen for a message because it was her first time. He said he would look for a medium to get a full message for her later in the day.

At Grove Service, mediums give as many messages as possible in an hour.

Like Jacob, Suzi Santiago of Orlando received a message the first time she came to the service.

Suzi said the guest medium, Pat Shepard from England, brought her mother and grandmother through and the message was spot on.

"I appreciated her connecting and sharing," she said. "It's telling me they're around me."

Hymns Come Alive at Sunday Service

It happens just about every Sunday.

On the way to Colby Memorial Temple, both Rev. Ben Cox and Rev. Mary Rose Gray think about what they will perform during the interlude of Sunday service. By the time they arrive, they have agreed.

“We often arrive at the temple having thought of the same piece for interlude while traveling from two widely separated places,” Ben said. “Rev. Mary Rose and I have worked together for so long that it’s almost like one person.”

“Now that’s being truly in spirit,” Mary Rose said, of the Sunday occurrence. “Music is a unifier.”

The pair have performed together during Sunday Service for about 15 years.

Ben plays the Clavinova. It looks like a keyboard and contains the sound of many instruments, which allows him to “create my own orchestrations.” He plays traditional hymns, as well as the background music for the healing meditation in the beginning of the service.

“I play because I love to play,” he said. “Playing for church is a ‘real gas’ for me. It’s always fun to try new settings of hymns.”

Mary Rose, a soprano with a nearly

three octave range, is also known as “The Voice of Cassadaga.” It was a name given to her by a visiting British medium a decade ago. She said the music of Sunday Service is soulful.

“It’s my special opportunity to share how spirit flows through me with the congregation,” she said. “I actually feel their responses. It’s a lovely exchange of energy.”

They usually perform five songs. “When we perform, he’s a great support,” Mary Rose said. “He’s like a cloud to float on, to me. He just carries you along. He has magic fingers. It’s great energy when I work with him.”

Ben added: “She is a joy to play for and is an inspiration for some of the orchestrations and improvisations.”

Mary Rose began singing at an early age during “back porch family instrumentals.” She signed up for choir whenever possible and in high school, she was selected to be in the All Ohio Youth Choir.

Later in life, she took to performing musicals in local community theaters throughout Central Florida. She won the lead roles in 70 musicals and performed other roles in the 20 years spent in theater.

Rev. Ben has been a performer since he was 6. He plays the organ, piano,

harpsichord and all the woodwinds. He is also a trained singer – a light lyric baritone, able to reach most tenor material.

Ben has two degrees from Stetson University – a bachelor of music and a bachelor of music education. He recently earned his master’s degree in liberal studies from Rollins College in Winter Park.


The pair met 20 years ago while sitting in a mediumship circle at Cassadaga Spiritualist Camp. Neither knew of each others music abilities.

In addition to Sunday service, the pair usually perform at Christmas Service. They have also worked together during mediumship concert messages, where the name of tune is written on a billet and placed in a basket. Billets are selected by a person and then read out loud. A spirit communicator comes through the song while it’s being performed.

Both enjoy their time with one another.

“We’ve had a wonderful time serving spirit together,” Ben said. “I hope we have many years left together in the future.”

Mary Rose added: “We make a great team.”

Students Carry On The Camp's Name

People are led to Cassadaga Spiritualist Camp for many reasons – to reach loved ones in spirit; to be with like minded people; to find answers concerning life after death. Then there are those who realize they have gifts and want to enhance them through classes. Ultimately, they enter the student program

That's what Sanford resident Claire A. Van Cott did. She visited Cassadaga three years ago not knowing about the development classes offered, although she had taken a course with one of the camp certified mediums in Orlando.

When she learned of the classes in Cassadaga, she began taking as many as she could – sometimes four a week. She studied healing, mediumship, natural law, ethics, religions and several metaphysical topics.

"If it was offered, I tried to participate," she said.

Claire became a student in November of 2008. She is a Level 3 student, which means she is able to work publicly. She has participated in the healing portion of Sunday Service at Colby Memorial Temple and given messages during Grove Service and other gatherings.

"Working publicly is an honor," she said. "It deepens your skill level and your connection to spirit. You also develop your awareness of ethics and public speaking in general."

To become a student, one must be a member of Cassadaga Spiritualist Camp and chose a certifying evaluator. The education and certification committee

verify courses taken and evaluate progress before taking their recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

Rev. Dr. Don Zanghi is chairperson of the education committee. He said it could take anywhere from two or three years to 14 years to complete the mediumship and/or healing program.

Don, who has a doctor of ministry, said course work includes history of spiritualism, history of Cassadaga, mediumship and various definitions, ethics, platform decorum, how to conduct a service, spiritual healing and knowing different types of healing available.

"It's like a college degree in a lot of ways," he said.

There are four levels in the mediumship and healing programs.

Level 1 students participate in service, i.e., hand out hymnals and light candles at Sunday Service, and attend classes; Level 2 public work; Level 3 guest medium at Wednesday night message service; and Level 4 read from platform during Sunday Service.

Rev. Dr. Louis Gates is chairperson of the certification committee. He said the certifying evaluator will put in an application on behalf of their student in regards to moving to the next level in the programs.

Louis, who has a doctor of metaphysical sciences, said when the education components are met, stu-

dents must show evidence that they are in communication with the other side.

"We see how the student [medium] demonstrates and monitor their advancement," he said.

Both Don and Louis report back to the members of the Board of Trustees, who vote on the request. They also went through the student programs themselves, taking about five years to become a certified medium and healer. The ministerial program took about six years to complete.

To enter the ministerial program, Don said the student must be a certified medium. Course work is at a higher level of education. It includes how to conduct a funeral and wedding, ministerial counseling, pastoral healing, house blessings and comparative religions.

Both hope to see more students in the programs.

"It's our future," Don said. "We need more students to come in who are truly dedicated to be mediums and healers."

Louis added: "We would love people to come to the camp and fall in love with Spiritualism. We also would like students who are here and love Cassadaga to take up the torch, so the camp is here for many years to come."

As for Claire, she'll keep at it until she becomes a certified medium and healer. "Serving spirit is truly my honor and my life's work," she said.

Gala Days : 'We have something for everyone'

Cassadaga Spiritualist Camp celebrated its 115th year with a dedication ceremony to its founder, George P. Colby, and another well-known Spiritualist of the camp, Julia Slater.

On Nov. 21, 2009, the Board of Trustees along with camp members celebrated Heritage Pioneer Gala Day. Hundreds from the community attended the all-day event that included the unveiling of Colby-Alderman Park and the Julia Slater Historical Museum.

"It was an exciting day," Anita Evans, camp historian, said. "It gave us a chance to tell our story."

Anita, the vice-president of the Board of Trustees, who also spearheaded the projects, said visiting the museum gives everyone a chance to put the faces with the names you hear during the Historical Orb Tour.

Many pictures and documents from the late 1800s are rare and some are one of a kind and have never been exhibited before, such as the one of our founder George Colby at the age of 20 and pictures of his mother and father. There are also items from some of the pioneer families as well as their furniture.

Other items on display in the three room museum include Spiritualist reading cards that don't have numbers, but look like a deck of cards, hymnals, a Cassadaga program dating back to 1902 and another program from 1903 that reveals the bylaws, the charter, articles of corporation and the first camp map, which was filed with Volusia County in 1902.

"It is an exiting blend," she said. "And we hope to grow and expand to include the library at some future date."

Next year, Anita said, "We will celebrate Pioneer Gala Day again and I encourage not only the camp residents but also attendees to dress in Victorian attire and take a stroll down our winding and hilly area which almost makes you feel as if you have actually stepped back in time."

Colby-Alderman (William & Lena Alderman) Park has 12 interpretive panels that tell the story of George Colby, Spiritualism and the events in the area during the late 1800s and early 1900s. Pathways are paved an unpaved on the trail.

Marsha Titus and her husband, Bob, traveled from DeLand to attend the opening of the new park. They last visited the area 10 or 12 years ago with their late friend William Amory Underhill, who is the grandson of William Michael Alderman and Wilford Perry Underhill.

Marsha said most everything is the same, except for the groves and the springs.

"It's absolutely fabulous," she said of the panels and the pathways. "It's a nice layout."

John Lefeber of Port Orange enjoyed the park as well.

"It's interesting," he said. "I enjoyed the beauty of it and the serenity."

Four times yearly, Cassadaga Spiritualist Camp holds a Gala Day, which is usually on the third Saturday in February, May, August and November.

Camp mediums give mini readings while healers bring in spiritual energy to assist with those in need. The Andrew Jackson Davis Building is filled with vendors – some spill into the streets, as well as Colby Memorial Temple. Short lectures on Spiritualism and Natural Law among other subjects are given periodically throughout the day.

"It [Gala Days] gives the camp a chance to show what there is to offer," Rev. Jean Sourant said. "We have something for everyone."

Rev. Jean, a camp elder, said that Gala Days have been a mainstay, dating back to at least 1987. She said it's about mediums and healers helping others. Gala Days have grown since then and that's fine by Rev. Jean.

"People will get what they need when they come," she said.

June Haber of Port Charlotte said she loves to visit Cassadaga. She was there for Heritage Pioneer Gala Day.

"As you step onto the grounds, there's a peacefulness, a calmness that flows over you," she said. "There's a lot of good energy here."

Raymond Smith, who lives in Deltona for part of the year, said it's the first time he's ever visited Cassadaga.

"This is an interesting community," he said. "I've never experienced anything like this. It's an entity of its own. I'm surprised we haven't been here before. We'll be back."


